Shirley and Ernie Alexander: Hi, I'm Ernie Alexander, class of 1964, and my wife, Shirley, class of 1954. That means she's much older than I am. I quit and came back to school is what I did. It's wonderful to be here for Homecoming, folks, and I gotta tell you we had a wonderful thing for the past alumni presidents last night at the Alumni Center.
