Library Partners with Advance

Last spring, **Drea Broussard** and **Olivia Peltier** introduced [DUPRExPATHWAYS](#), a new program series in collaboration with ASRE Pathways that provides additional research support to students pursuing the Pathways endorsement. Several librarians also provide research services embedded in courses required for Pathways completion. This fall, eligible Pathways disciplines increased from five to 27 and with it, librarians have been hard at work to continue this partnership and increase support to more students than ever.

Advance Equipment Grants

The library received \$10,000 in Advance Equipment Grants from the Student Center for Research, Creativity & Scholarship (SCRCS).
